Paint Tacoma Beautiful: Rising to the Challenge of Neighborhood Sustainability

Tacoma native and veteran Ricky was desperate for a change. He was tired of living in the "ugliest house on the block," and had been looking into exterior painting services. The first quote he received came back high... and the next... and the next. He wasn't sure if he would ever be able to afford to get his house painted.

That's when Ricky heard about Associated Ministries' Paint Tacoma Beautiful program through our partnership with Puget Sound Energy. He dropped off a homeowner application and was connected to AM's Volunteer Specialist Mary Hoffmann, who let him know that his house had been chosen just two weeks after he applied for the program.

Mary met with Ricky and showed him a color swatch from Sherwin-Williams. While he was originally thinking of a light blue color for his house, he quickly changed his mind when he saw the dark blue paint AM already had.

He shared about his first meeting with Mary,

recalling he was "just shocked, surprised, and happy to be picked." Soon after, he met with Heidi Maloney from Unity of South Sound, head of the volunteer crew that would be painting his house. They agreed the project would be completed over four weekends.

When the day came to start, Heidi's volunteer

team of 20+ persons came and visited with Ricky. They wrote messages of love, hope, and encouragement on his house in primer, before painting them over later with the blue paint he had chosen.

Ricky remembers this as the best part of the whole experience: "Just the kindness of everyone, it was overwhelming to me, in the best way." Ricky

said the volunteers were positive, happy, and constantly laughing and smiling, even after long days of painting.

Participating in AM's Paint Tacoma Beautiful program has had a significant impact on Ricky's life. When asked about what having his house

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Faith Land Stewardship: Rising to the Challenge of Mixed-income Housing

Even in Pastor Susan's very first week leading Mason United Methodist Church (UMC), it was already clear that there was an opportunity to steward the church's resources in a new way to care for their community. Within a few months, a bold vision began to form. After reviewing budget numbers and surveying her church's building and property, Pastor Susan began looking into potential partners for a new, innovative community space for their church campus within the historic Proctor neighborhood of Tacoma. The vision caught on, and her congregation, business partners, and neighbors alike joined her in her quest to make the impossible possible through the power of partnership.

The goal for this space, currently titled "Project Mason," is to be a place of refuge and resource connection for vulnerable individuals and families living in North Tacoma by providing meaningful ministry, mixed-income housing, spiritual formation, outreach resources, and neighborhood connection opportunities. Pastor Susan and Mason UMC's hope is that it will be "a spirit-centered community for the 21st century," a place to reach out and love people, with its services providing entry-ways into diverse community.

For Mason UMC, caring for their neighbors has always been a priority. With this in mind, they are seeking to create a community-oriented space that connects tenants in need to services like food banks, 12-step groups, and emergency financial assistance. The felt need for mixed-income housing, childcare, and inclusive spaces remains a strong driver of this project, with the primary focus being mixed-income housing that is intentionally diverse in all forms, as well as thoughtfully designed areas such as multi-use worship spaces, green spaces, and meditation spaces.

Outreach resources could include a non-profit/classroom space, public resources, or a community garden.

Neighborhood connections could mean utilizing and maximizing the shared space for a variety of events, lectures, meetings, art and music shows, and more.

The Project Mason campus hopes to meet people well on their journeys to wholeness and health by breaking down the walls that threaten to divide people and prioritizing and celebrating diversity, journey, and story.

Mason UMC's recent step towards providing mixedincome housing opportunities is a step we at Associated Ministries have observed several faith communities take in new and invigorated efforts to steward their unused or underutilized land to care for the most vulnerable. Congregations are continuing to seek development, financial, and outreach partners in this work.

Since the beginning of time, people of faith and goodwill have been called to love their neighbors in the most difficult of circumstances, acting as agents of healing, restoration, and peace-building. AM is honored to come alongside Mason UMC as they live out this commitment through the creation of Project Mason. We remain devoted to being an effective convener of faith communities – and our community at large – inspiring all interfaith partners to work for the common good and to have a part in their community's flourishing.
